Course Goals

- To develop music literacy through listening to, thinking about and writing about music and through study of the elements and history of music
- To encourage lifelong learning in music through concert attendance and personal listening
- To develop skills in using the Internet as a resource

Course Objectives

By the end of the term, students are expected to be able to:

- Identify salient characteristics of music from various periods and genres
- Use the Internet to find more information about the music
- Describe music using appropriate terminology
- Place compositions into the appropriate period based on the composer's birth/death dates as well as the characteristics of the music
- Identify significant historical events related to each of the major style periods of music
- Recognize elements of visual art, literature and drama that relate to musical style from the same time period
- Make informed choices about music
