Each year the conference has grown and proudly hosted many highly accomplished keynote speakers including: Wes Moore, Michael Eric Dyson, and Dr. Paul Farmer. And this year we are hosting critically acclaimed author, Imani Perry- who is renowned for her work exploring the intersections of history, race, law, and culture.

During the pandemic, we learned many creative ways to deliver classroom instructions, conduct virtual meetings, master dynamic forms, deliver hands-on laboratory experiences and deliver a virtual Equity and Inclusion conference with just under 500 registrants. We moved from on-ground, to virtual, to hybrid, to now back to on-ground without missing a beat. I hope you enjoy all of the networking opportunities and strategically planned learning sessions that this conference will provide.

For our readers outside of the university community, ETSU's story began in 1911 on land once owned by railroad magnate, George L. Carter. Our institutional foundation was as a normal school. More than a hundred years ago ETSU and the state of Tennessee sought to uplift the region through education. This goal helped to improve the life prospects of countless citizens in our region and beyond.

But many of our citizens, African Americans in particular, were left behind as de jure segregation prevented African Americans from enrolling at ETSU. Only court orders, especially *Brown v. Board of Education, finally opened the door to integration. African American faculty at ETSU did not exist prior to mid-to-late 1970. And the institution struggled to hire and retain faculty well into the nineties.*

By the end of the twentieth century ETSU increasingly reflected a rapidly changing world. ETSU's advancements began with racial diversity but later included gender diversity, sexual diversity, and ethnic diversity. And ETSU student body is more diverse today than at any other time in its longstanding history.

This conference is a celebration of our central institutional mission: to educate people without regard to race, gender, sexual orientation, or place of origin. Numerous breakout sessions have been built to discuss practical ways all faculty, staff, and administrators can improve and promote the ETSUs goal of being welcoming and accepting of everyone. Those lessons learned could be inferred to any college or university.

Further, this conference focuses on the basic humanity of every person and the reasonable expectation that every person deserves respect. Our focus this year is called: "Beyond Checking a Box: Building and Sustaining Campus-Wide Engagement for Belonging."

Perry's academic and literary contributions, including her National Book Award-winning work "South to America: A Journey Below the Mason-Dixon to Understand the Soul of a Nation," explores how the South shapes American history and culture. Her numerous accolades, including awards for her exploration of the life of underrecognized Black artist Lorraine Hansberry, firmly position her as a significant figure in contemporary literature and academia.
