




Foster makes 'inspiring Black scientists' list

Salmonella study

TNIPH to expand Correctional Career Pathways The Tennessee Institute of Public

Health (TNIPH) at ETSU's College of Public Health has been awarded a second grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) to further expand the Correctional Career Pathways program in Appalachian Tennessee. The program gives non-violent offenders in local jails the opportunity to break the cycle of arrest and incarceration and transition into the workforce.
